

Robert Corn-Revere

Mr. Corn-Revere is a partner in the Washington, D.C. office of Hogan & Hartson L.L.P., concentrating in First Amendment, Internet and communications law. He regularly advises clients on FCC and Internet-related issues and has served as counsel in First Amendment litigation involving the Communications Decency Act, the Child Online Protection Act, Internet content filtering in public libraries and export controls on encryption software. In 1999, Mr. Corn-Revere was listed on a 30th Anniversary Roll of Honor by the American Library Association Office of Intellectual Freedom and Freedom to Read Foundation for his role as lead counsel in *Mainstream Loudoun v. Board of Trustees of the Loudoun County Library*

Before joining Hogan & Hartson in 1994, Mr. Corn-Revere served as Chief Counsel to Interim Chairman James H. Quello of the Federal Communications Commission. Previously, from 1990 until 1993, he was Commissioner Quello's Legal Advisor. Before entering government service, Mr. Corn-Revere was an associate at Hogan & Hartson from 1985 to 1990, and at another Washington D.C. firm from 1983 to 1985.

Since 1987, Mr. Corn-Revere has taught at the Communications Law Institute of the Columbus School of Law, Catholic University of America. He currently teaches a seminar in First Amendment law, and is faculty advisor to CommLaw Conspectus, a journal of communications law and policy. He is Chairman of the Media Institute's First Amendment Advisory Council and is a member of the Institute's Board of Trustees. Mr. Corn-Revere is also an Adjunct Scholar to the Cato Institute and to Citizens for a Sound Economy Foundation in Washington D.C.

Mr. Corn-Revere has written extensively on First Amendment, Internet and communications-related issues and is a frequent speaker at professional conferences. He is co-author of a three-volume treatise entitled, "Modern Communications Law," published by the West Group in 1999. In addition, Mr. Corn-Revere serves on the Editorial Advisory Board of Pike & Fischer's Internet Law & Regulation, the Editorial Board of Commercial Speech Digest and the Board of Advisors of the Online Ombuds Office of the University of Massachusetts Center for Information Technology and Dispute Resolution. In the past Mr. Corn-Revere worked

as a journalist, both for daily newspapers, and for magazines as a freelance writer.

Mr. Corn-Revere received his J.D. from the Columbus School of Law in 1983, where he was Lead Articles Editor of the Catholic University Law Review. He earned an M.A. from the University of Massachusetts-Amherst in 1980 and a B.A. from Eastern Illinois University in 1977. Mr. Corn-Revere is a member of the District of Columbia Bar, as well as the United States Supreme Court, District of Columbia, Third, Fourth, and Eleventh Circuit Bars.
